THE ELMER DUFFIELD HOUSE – A HISTORY LESSON

The Elmer Duffield house, located just north of the 39 milepost of Pierce Ferry Road and below the road on your right, is now owned by the National Park Service. The original spelling for the road was Pearce by those familiar with the history of Harrison Pearce who built and ran the ferry crossing the Colorado River just below the Grand Wash Cliffs and when Elmer Duffield first arrived on Grapevine Mesa, in 1931, that was the spelling of this dirt road. In fact, when he and his wife, Elma, bought their land and began building their house, that was the spelling of the road. Elmer came to fish and hunt gold. In the late '30's he signed on to survey and begin building the cement base pillars for what was to be the Boulder Canyon Dam. All work on the dam stopped after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. Elmer and Elma returned to Grapevine Mesa to begin building their adobe home in the mid-1960's.

They did all of the structure work and made their own adobe bricks. The home was decorated with matates, manos, kachinas, pottery and handpainted flagstone items given to them by their Hopi friends. Hand-painted tables given to Elma were done by Oswald 'White Bear' Fredericks of Oribi. They decorated their floors with turquoise and pot shards. The kitchen had a round Hopi stove for baking bread, the living area had a round fireplace. They planted fruit trees and shade trees, with vines shading the walkway.

This home, and Jess and Faye Ladds trailer home on Fortification and Mead Drive were the first homes in the Meadview area.

Elmer and Elma loved living close to Lake Mead and spent many days fishing, but in 1974 the U.S. government decided that houses seen from the Lake detracted from the ambience of boating on a wild uncivilized lake, therefore they started removing the homes on Skylight Drive, that were built on the rim south of the Lost Basin Monument and approached Elmer. For a number of years Elmer and the Feds 'debated' the question of their home being condemned. Elmer was stubborn and eventually, figuring this could become a 10 year war, the U.S. government agreed that the Duffields could continue living in the home until both of them were dead. Upon the death of both the land and house would go to the Lake Mead Recreational Area for use by the NPS either as a Ranger Office or maybe even a Museum.

ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES TITLE 49, CHAPTER SEVEN IS THE "DARK SKY ORDINANCE"

Passed in 1987, the law says that all nonconforming yard or porch lights must be off from midnight until dawn to give amateur astronomers and star-gazers a chance to enjoy the beauty of the night-time Arizona skies.

It further states that mercury-vapor lights are not to be installed after 1987 or repaired after 1991 and further, they will all need to be removed by the year 2001.

SO BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR AND INSTALL MOTION DETECTOR LIGHTS! Elma died first and with help from Meadview friends Elmer lived until 1997. During those last years Elaine Phebus recorded Elmer's life story on tape in hopes that someday she would be able to write a book about him. After his death the Lake Mead and Grand Canyon Rangers used the home as their office. They also held meetings in the home with the many volunteers from Meadview who helped man the NPS boats, cleaned the beaches, and the road down to the South Cove Ramp and controlled the traffic at the boat ramp on Holidays. At one time 30 Meadview residents were VIP's for the NPS. The VIP program disbanded years ago.

Ten years ago the NPS considered tearing down the house as it was becoming a run-down derelict and NPS had no money to spend to repair it. The residents of Meadview protested and the NPS backed off, but now, the NPS is again wondering what should be done with this home. It is now 50 years old and could be on the list of Historic buildings but it needs some care, repair and TLC. Residents of Meadview need to once again become aware of the possibility of losing this bit of history but this time we need to offer our services to the NPS, not just our protests. Go check it out, see the pot shards and flagstone, the handmade adobe bricks. Maybe some grant money to the NPS would buy the materials. Perhaps the Meadview VIP's could once again become active. The NPS needs to know Meadview is willing to put forth some effort to restore this Historical home. To begin with we need to offer to pull weeds, remove dead trees and piles of rubble.

Let either myself or Vern Farris hear from you. Think about creating a Lake Mead Visitors Center or a Meadview Museum.

DUFFIELDS' LIVES BEAR A WEALTH OF HISTORY

A story about Elmer and Elma Duffield is more than a story of what most people would consider an average retired couple.

Instead, it's a story of a simple way of life of two fantastic people, filled with every emotion known to man today.

There is love. Love for each other, their home and their Hopi Indian friends.

There is disgust. Disgust for those who would destroy the scenic wonders of Arizona and for those who have robbed the Hopis of their way of life and identity. There is pride. Elmer and Elma are proud of the home they have completely made themselves and proud of what they have accomplished between them in over a century of life.

There are so many emotions wrapped up in the lives of these two people that it would take a historian and analyst years to uncover and describe.

This writer first met Elmer Labor Day weekend at the Meadview Marina Store. His beard showed an easy two-days growth and the cigarette that dangled from his mouth caught my eye immediately. It was a "roll-your-own", something that has seemed to disappear from the American way of life over the past two decades.

He was cordial, but unimpressed that I was going to do a story about he and Elma for the Monitor. At first I thought it was going to be a rough afternoon, as he talked very little and departed with an abrupt, "See you this afternoon".

But that couldn't have been farther from the truth.

After a warm introduction, we sat down at the kitchen table of one of their houses for a cup of coffee and conversation.

The 45 minutes I had allotted myself for the interview quickly turned into two hours, then three, and then four. During the first hour, our roles were completely reversed — they asked questions and I answered them.

But soon we found a common ground (both born and raised in northern Arizona with some of the same acquaintances) and the interview was over. Instead, it seemed like a conversation between old friends.

Elmer's knowledge of the Meadview-Pierce's Ferry area is most likely unsurpassed by anyone here today.

Born in 1913, he first came to the area in 1931 to prospect for gold near Pierce's Ferry. He and a friend came in a new Model A Ford and that's about all they left with. In other words, the gold they found would not have started a big rush.

He first started fishing Lake Mead in 1937 and in 1941-42 he worked at the Bridge Canyon Dam Site (48 miles upriver from Pierce's Ferry) testing footings and core drilling.

During that time, he developed the worst hatred for catfish imaginable, he said.

"I was caught for 18 days with 30 other men when driftwood and low water clogged up the bay where we were working. We ran out of food and salt and ate nothing but humpback carp and catfish that we dynamited out of the river," (sic) Elmer said.

Elma quickly added that to this day he still won't take her catfishing.

She was born in Dallas and came to Arizona in 1950 after 20 years with Western Union in San Francisco and other areas. From 1950 until 1968 she owned and operated El's Place in Sedona.

Married for eight years, a poet couldn't have picked a better place for them to have met. You guessed it—Pierce's Ferry.

They finally returned to the area and Meadview in November of 1968. Elmer was the first Meadview property owner and it's (sic) first resident, coming here initially in 1960.

Since their return, they have turned Elmer's vast knowledge of contracting an a lot of hard work into their homes in Meadview.

They have completely built their home by themselves. They have a brick making machine that rurns (sic) out 40-50 per hour and all of the masonry work was done by the couple. Both houses are lined with fantastic wood cabinets Elmer makes in his spare time.

They both share the pride of doing it all by themselves,. They enjoy their homes and surroundings, both of which are dotted with testimonials of their close relationship with the Hopi Indians.

"Matates" and "Manos", rock tools used by Indian and Mexican to grind corn, number over 100 and attractively add a flavorful setting to their front yard.

Other forms of Indian art such as kachinas and pottery from the Hopi reservation dot their home, as do several handwoven rugs. Elma has 10 different rugs and as she says, "They all tell a story".

But probably the most treasured of all artifacts and crafts are a pair of hand-painted flagstone tabletops given to Elma for her birthday.

The tabletops were painted by Oswald "White Bear" Fredericks, famous Hopi artist from Oribi on the reservation in Northern Arizona. United States Senator Barry Goldwater of Arizona has over 100 Kachinas painted by White Bear.

"They are modern petrographs," (sic) Elmer explains, adding "Each symbol has a meaning from the ancient symbols of the Hopi."

The Duffields have a vast knowledge of the Hopi Indian tribe and attribute it to the many trips they have made to the reservation 135 miles north of Flagstaff.

"We have many friends among the Hopis," (sic) Elmer says. "We take food, clothing, furniture, toys and candy on our trips." However, they were quick to add, they do not consider it a charity, but a "deep friendship".

He continued, "it took us six years before we got to know them and be accepted, but now, we are treated as friends. We have had the honor of witnessing several Hopi religious ceremonies that few white men have ever seen."

The Duffields like their Meadview home. It brings back many memories to Elmer. He can tell stories about working as a cowhand at the Diamond Bar Ranch near here and of the wild horses that once roamed the Grand Wash Cliffs.




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

FROM FOOTPRINTS ON THE GRAPEVINE MESA - ELMER DUFFIELD'S HOME

In 1931 Elmer and Elma Duffield came to Grapevine Mesa to fish and prospect and in 1940 and 1941 he worked on what was going to become the Bridge Canyon Dam. Elmer worked on the survey crew and then poured the cement footers before the Sierra Cub brought the project to a grinding halt. When WWII started, the government found it a good reason to stop all work on the project. The dam would have allowed a shorter trip into Utah would provide a lake off the Hualapai Reservation to be used for recreation. This would have provided work for the Hualapai and a way for the tribe to support itself.

Elmer returned to Grapevine Mesa and he and his wife El began building their home (where the NPS now has their Ranger station). They did all of the work, mixing cement, gathering rocks, making adobe blocks. They planted fruit trees, many which still produce some fruit. Elmer refused to leave his home in the 70's when the NPS determined that the few homes set up on the ridge overlooking the lake would be unsightly for the boaters. Finally the federal government (probably tired of dealing with Elmer) set up a plan that he and El could live in their home until both of them died. Then the house and land would go to the LMNRA. Elmer died in August 1997.

FRIENDS OF THE ARIZONA JOSHUA TREE FOREST

Sharon Baur, representing the Friends of AZ Joshua Tree Forest board, attended an invitation only seminar in Phoenix on May 22 and 23 hosted by the Conservation Lands Foundation. The focus of the seminar was to highlight ways that we, as a Friends board, can be better stewards in preserving and protecting our magnificent Joshua Tree Forest. Many ideas and tools were discussed and we look forward to using these in our efforts in the future.



Our involvement in the USGS Joshua Tree study took a step further on June 6. Todd Esque (USGS Research Ecologist), along with a colleague and two of our board members began the process of establishing permanent study plots in our forest. The team measured a 50 meter square area for the first of several permanent plots. Within this area, data was collected on each Joshua Tree such as height, diameter of trunk, and number of terminal buds. Each tree was photographed, numbered and tagged for future identification. All unusual observations were also recorded such as a curious pattern of raised bumps noted on one tree's leaves. Another permanent plot will be established in the fall and we hope to have some volunteers willing to help in this process. The goal of establishing these plots is for us to consistently gather and keep data on all trees within the plots for future analysis and comparison to other stands of Joshua Trees across the Mohave desert.



Our first field trip for students from Mohave Community College enrolled in a summer biology class occurred on June 10. A professor and eight students met with three board members that morning and spent a couple of hours exploring the forest and learning about the climate zones, Joshua Tree reproduction and growth patterns, and how fragile the desert environment is. After this tour of the forest, the group convened at the MCA for a showing of our video and lunch. Thanks to the MCA board for allowing us use of the auditorium. The students were very enthusiastic and overwhelmed by the beauty and uniqueness of our Joshua Trees. Most had no idea such a special place existed so close to Kingman. The day was a great success and we hope to continue this relationship with MCC and host more field trips. Some students also expressed a willingness to volunteer in future projects and activities.
