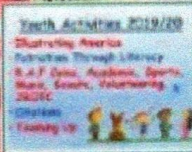

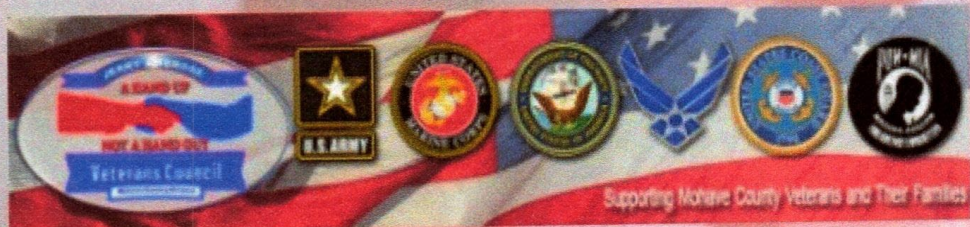

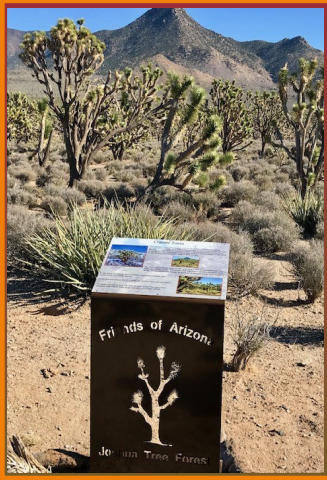

WILD HORSES FOUND ALONG STOCKTON HILL ROAD and PIERCE FERRY ROAD

Motorists traveling on Stockton Hill or Pierce Ferry roads have been known to find a pinto mare and her baby standing in the middle of the road. The car stops and the driver waits, then taps his horn, then he waits again. When the very young colt finishes lunch, he and his mama amble to the side of the road. This was the scene a few years ago, but it is seldom repeated these last ten years. At the time Meadviewites sometimes saw small groups of horses in our hills along Stockton Hill or Pierce Ferry road. We were told the herd of 75 horses lived in the Cerbat Range between Chloride and Dolan Springs and for a few years a few would roam into the Red Lake area coming down Vock Canyon probably hunting water and graze.

Genetic testing on the herd shows they are related to the Sorraias horses that arrived in America when the Spanish rode up from Mexico. Today there are only about 200 of this breed left in the world.

A spokesperson for the International Society for Protection of Mustangs and Burros has stated that this herd is the most unique wild horse herd in the United States and in 1996 an agreement was presented to develop a Cerbat Mountain Wild Horse Management Plan to preserve this entire herd. The agreement with EPA cooperating with developers and real estate people was to keep developers from encroaching into the herd's roaming area. But since 2001 the horses, themselves, have started moving into developed areas and have become quite adapted to the people living along Pierce Ferry.

According to some wild horse experts, the wild horse is healthier, more intelligent and more adaptable than his domestic counterpart. An average quarter horse continues sound until age seven while the wild horse may stay healthy much longer and may live to be 25 to 30 years old. This herd shows the regale portrait of the Sorraias with graceful necks, refined heads, erect ears, long- legs with small hooves. The herd consisting of bays, grays, pintos, sorrels, and blacks.

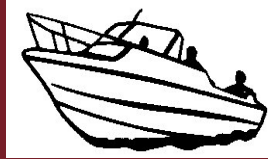

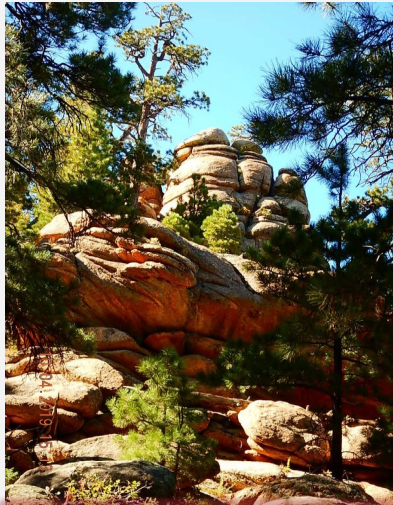

MEADVIEW ROADS

Someone wrote a parody to the tune of "On Top of Old Smokey", only here in Meadview it is "On Top of Old Grand Wash". One part goes: "Our roads are all bumpy and full of potholes. Getting them fixed is one of our goals" How true. Maybe it should be changed to our #1 Goal.

I have been asked by MCA President, Hart to write an article on this complex subject, probably because I was involved for over 3 years on the Jamaica Drive project. I did learn quite a lot by this experience. At times it was frustrating, but also very interesting. I am far from an expert, but glad to share what I have learned.

I need to say that I have not been authorized by C.O.M. (Community Organization of Meadview) to write about roads. It has traditionally been their effort. I write as a citizen to share information and to offer suggestions. I hope others will write also, the more information we can gather, the better.

One of the most often phrases heard in our community is: "WHY don't THEY fix these roads?" Well, it seems the answer is that the "THEY" is US! How could this be?

Looking back on the days when the developers had the roads bulldozed in the 1960/70s, it seems that they never were up to Mohave County standards; the right width, etc. This applies to roads that were once paved and are now so badly deteriorated after years of neglect. The developers never did the final step (except a very few in the beginning) of petitioning the County for maintenance. So, if it is anyone's fault, it is theirs. No use thinking about blame now. Rather let us take the positive approach of working together to find HOW to go about it.

For years C.O.M. and before the name change, it was R.I.P.P.L.E. (Rural Improvements, Positive Programs, through Local Efforts) who have made many efforts to take on this big project. One example is the repaving of Meadview Boulevard to Haystack. It took from 3 to 4 years with many fund raisers to bring it up to County specifications so it would be

accepted for maintenance. This is the main road in our community. How proud we were of this achievement. For a while after that, we called our "pothole of the week" into RIPPLE. They would fill the hole with blacktop left over until it ran out.

Another often heard remark is: "I pay my taxes, so why don't they fix my roads?" If you look at your tax bill, you will see no mention of roads. It comes from another pot of money. Most of the money goes to places with more population.

Yes, it is true that our roads are a mess! Were some of our pioneers of Meadview (or any of us) told that no one was going to come here to maintain them?

It has become an almost emotional subject as you are trying to get around, knowing your shocks and tires are taking a beating. Sometimes it looks hopeless, but, Jamaica Drive was finally fixed. The Dangerous Intersection deep dips and hills on Pierce Ferry Road smoothed out (who would have thought they would?), thanks to the persistence of letter writing by Fred Wilson. It can be done! The key is to find the way; be diplomatic; and persistent.

Jamaica Drive was a unique situation as this 1100 feet of road is on National Park land. The County was willing to fix it, but it took many meetings and letters to get approval from NPS. This will not be necessary for the rest of Meadview roads (I don't think). They met us on Jamaica Drive and explained there were 2 ways it could be done. First, the County Public Works was called. They were helpful and cooperative.

I live in Unit 4, which is all dirt roads. A few years ago (approx. 5?) we became a 'Road Maintenance District'. Public Works told us how to do this. The County says it is not in the road building business.

First, YOU have to have the roads graded. A few of us paid \$20 a time or two for this. Then Public Works inspects. It only means they may grade

them once or twice a year. This is better than nothing, but it does not help the problem of places where washes cause constant erosion. This is a hazard not only for us who drive them, but also for visitors — especially after dark.

It was the intention of RIPPLE then, now (COM) to continue to go Unit by Unit in an effort to form road districts. Then other projects came along and new people and new ideas.

The other term for getting roads fixed is a 'Road Improvement District'. Roads that were once paved and are badly deteriorated would probably fall into an Improvement District which requires an assessment. Most people don't want that. Property owners who don't live here could be encouraged that improved roads will add to their land value. It seems logical to form committees in each unit as they were developed at different times. In some units there is a mix of once paved and dirt roads. More information needs to be found how the old paved roads problem will be handled. It had been said that besides forming districts by Unit, it could be done by perhaps blocks.

I understand that COM has a road project they are working on. There needs to be more involvement of all of us working together. Attending COM meetings will give you some idea of the latest news on this. We need to get more information on how and what we can do about our roads. County Public Works is willing to meet with us to tell us about needed regulations. Keep in mind that such a meeting is not the place to cry and complain. We CAN accomplish a great deal with a positive attitude and diplomacy.

Thank you to the MCA for publishing this article. It is important to inform residents of Meadview and property owners who do not live here of the road situation. It is not the MCA who is responsible for roads. It is up to US> It we really ever hope to have any road improvements.

It's now 2001. Shall we get busy? Happy Trails to you!

WHO WAS CARLOS ELMER?

Why are there signs between milepost 33 and 34 on Pierce Ferry Road stating "Joshua View of Carlo Elmer"? The answer can be found in many Arizona Highway Magazines and especially two issues which featured photographs by Elmer which show our Grand Wash Cliffs and the gigantic, picturesque yucca known as the Joshua Tree. His photos have been prominent in many gallery showings and displays and in the Power House Information Center in Kingman.

Elmer arrived in Arizona when he was six. By age 19 he began a long career of contributing stories and photographs to the Arizona Highways Magazine. He graduated from UCLA and during WWII he served in the Army Air Corps. He became interested in the field of optical instrumentation and embarked on a career in the use of photography to measure scientific and engineering data used in rocket testing. He

authored a number of books and his photography appeared in national magazines.

Elmer's love of the Grand Wash Cliffs and the Joshua Tree Forest can be seen in his book MOHAVE COUNTY ARIZONA which is filled with his photographs of our area, beginning with a dirt road view of Pearce Ferry, Bridge Canyon, Hoover Dam, fishing in Iceberg Canyon and the view of the Joshua with a backdrop of the Grand Wash Cliffs. He also did several photographic studies of the MCA facility showing the pool and patio with a backdrop of those Cliffs. Shortly before his death he was once again in our area and dropped into the MCA office. Like the residents of Meadview, he was drawn to this area by the beauty of the Grand Wash Cliffs and the fascinating Joshua Tree.
