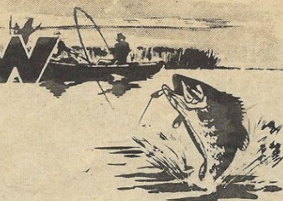

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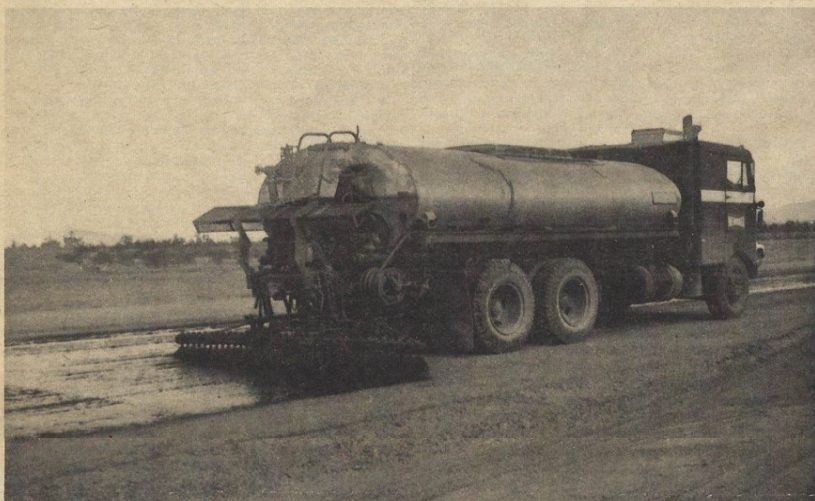

Boat And Trailer Traffic Increases

Mohave County's Supt. of Highways, Lee Stevens, and his hardy crew are on schedule with their paving of Pierce Ferry Road. As this paper goes to press the oil has been applied to within 8 miles of Meadview. Heavy equipment is working on realigning a short section of road just South of Meadview's Unit 3. There are also several high knolls in this 8 mile section of Pierce Ferry Road that have to be lowered and then compacted before the road oil can be applied. Undaunted by all this, the County road crew is making steady progress towards Meadview's fast growing community.

Reports show fall traffic to the upper Lake Mead fishing spots increases during the latter part of September and continues to increase from then on as the lake waters begin to cool and the game fish do their feeding nearer the surface of the water. The paving of Pierce Ferry Road means better road conditions to trailer boats to these favorite fishing grounds that heretofore have been mainly reached by water. Now the chances of being 'blown out' are greatly lessened. South Cove launching ramp will permit ingress or egress of boats in most severe weather conditions, and along with the paving, boats can now be trailered and launched with ease and avoid the large open water portions of Lake Mead, that can become very rough and dangerous during a windy period.

The campground and trailer park at Meadview are showing a steady increase of guests as road conditions improve. Now, vacationers pulling the larger self-contained vacation home away from home, will have no problems pulling these ingenious units into Meadview's modern park. The completion of the paving will come just as the desert explorers, rock hounders and artifact seekers break out in full force as this is the time of the year to indulge in these hobbies.

Granite Gorge Cruise Thanksgiving Weekend

Highlight of the upcoming four day Thanksgiving weekend, open to the public, will be this year's 4th and final cruise up the Colorado River to the Bridge Canyon Dam site. Meadview Adventurer Club members feel that this very popular and adventurous outing will be a fitting climax to Meadview's 1967 boating season.

To celebrate this special weekend, a lineup of events is planned starting Thursday evening, Nov. 23rd., with a Sportsman's Barbeque. Stereo music will be provided for those who wish to dance. Friday and Saturday, Nov. 24 and 25 are the days set for the exciting Lower Granite Gorge Cruise. The return trip from the River is planned for an early enough hour on Saturday so the participants can rest up before enjoying another steak barbeque Saturday night. On Sunday morning an outdoor breakfast will be held on the mesa overlooking Lake Mead and MAC members will be serving hotcakes, sausages and bacon, all you can eat for 75¢.

The 2 day Cruise will leave South Cove at 9 a.m. sharp, Arizona time, Nov. 24th, following a pilots meeting at 8:45 a.m. Everyone is requested to bring food for lunch on Friday, dinner Friday night and breakfast Saturday morning plus all the necessary gear for an overnight outing of this sort. Warm clothing will be in order for that time of the year.

As was discovered on the August cruise, a speed of approximately 20 miles per hour is the best in helping to avoid barraging up on the sand bars and this speed will be maintained throughout most of the trip. A reduced speed during the delta region will be kept, should it prove necessary.

Water conditions were a little better during the August cruise as the storms up river had added to the foot per second flow. It has been noted that the lake level has risen somewhat in the past two months and there is reason to believe the lake level will be maintained at this elevation, or perhaps somewhat higher. This higher level helps when crossing the delta region at Bradley Bay and Grand Wash.

As always, the river will have shifted her course somewhat and offers a challenge to each and all boat pilots. There is a tremendous feeling of achievement after completing a round trip cruise to the Bridge Canyon Dam site. Not only does one see a fabulous wonder of nature that very few people see from river level, but they have, in a way, mastered the mighty Colorado River current for 62 miles each way.

Following is an excerpt from one of Hal Brown's earlier columns, describing the trip in a more thorough manner and outlining the necessary gear to take and the

in and around meadview

When anyone mentions November to me I begin to smell turkey roasting in the oven and can savor all the goodies (all fattening) that go with a Thanksgiving feast. And this month also spells an end to many summer activities.

In looking back over past events one in particular is brought to mind, and this is the running of the Colorado River down through the fabulous Grand Canyon. Recently we had the opportunity of visiting with Ted Hatch, who's family has the distinction of running the river longer than any group. The day we visited with Ted spelled the end of this year's expeditions.

Hatch River Expeditions was formed in 1934 by Bus Hatch, who passed away in June of this year. Bus started running river trips from Vernal, Utah in 1926 through Dinosaur National Monument on the Yampa and Green Rivers. At the present time, his two sons Don and Ted operate the Expeditions through the Grand Canyon carrying more passengers, approximately 300 this year, than any other guide service in this area.

Passengers who have gone on river trips with Hatch River Expeditions include such notables as Senator Robert Kennedy, John Glen, Andy Williams, Jim Whitaker, Hugh O'Brien, Paul Harvey, Art Buchwald and Lowell Thomas.

Ted has the same feeling about the river as we do and ended up our conversation with him, by saying, "River trips are becoming more popular every year—there are many competent guides who can supply good expeditions through the Grand Canyon, the important thing is for people to get out and see this great natural wonder and enjoy it as we do."

Another activity that fall brings up short is a milder form of river running, and that is by canoe. A sport we knew little about until we recently met and talked with Hank and Fran Wilson, of Granada Hills, Calif. After talking to these hardy folks you can see how canoeing can get in your blood. Fran is the Secretary of the Valley Canoe Club and with a little prodding we got her to write a resume on how they became interested in this sport. The following is her recap:

"We're canoeists. We're at Meadview, and the events that lead to our visit started some ten years ago.

"We were visiting friends, and their niece's husband (now deceased) who was Senior Aquatics Director for the City of Los Angeles, showed us 35mm slides of a canoe trip on the lower Colorado River from Blythe to Fisher's Landing at Martinez Lake. He explained that he was trying to formulate a canoeing program within the city and was trying to get leaders of youth groups interested. We were so interested we asked if we could join them on a trip, which we did over a Labor Day week-end. We enjoyed the trip so much that we bought a fiberglass Johnson canoe.

"Due to my recent surgery and inability to paddle right now, the canoe after eight years of service is getting some much needed varnish and new webbing for the seats. And believe it or not, it's resting in the middle of the living room while we're away.

"We also joined the Southern California Canoe Assn., and there is still a program of safety being conducted. It begins with a ten week course in paddling, swamping session at a pool, five mile paddle at Cabrillo Beach out to the lighthouse and back, and culminates in a river trip on the lower Colorado River during the Easter vacation.

"These Easter trips needed chaperones and soon there were more than needed so we formed an adult family club, namely Valley Canoe Club. Each year V.C.C. puts out a trip schedule in January. We now have about forty families in our membership.

"Many of our trips were and are on parts of the Colorado River including one from Pierce Ferry to Bridge Canyon dam-site and back. These trips taught us to love the desert and we purchased a lot at the Colorado Riviera. We then received the Riviera News and then the Meadview Monitor.

"We decided this year to make our annual trip to Arizona at Meadview and it has been just wonderful, fine friendly people, rock hunting, a swim in the lake, barbecue (no cooking for me).

"We'll be back in November over the Thanksgiving holiday with the canoeists and rockhounds, and each October for a few years, after that they'll get tired of looking at us, as my husband will be retired and we can visit any old time.

"There's just one thing makes me mad right now . . . WE HAVE TO GO BACK TO THE STINKING SMOG AROUND LOS ANGELES."

I would like to add that fall is not the swan song to all outdoor activities. This Nov. 24-25 MAC plans another overnight motor boat cruise up the Lower Granite Gorge to Bridge Canyon Dam Site and again camping overnight at Spencer Canyon.

The fall and winter are the most active time of the year for rock hunting safaris into the high desert's remote regions so we at Meadview are looking forward to many such trips, as yet unscheduled but you can be assured are forthcoming. Now with Pierce Ferry Road receiving a paving job all the way to Meadview, we are prepared to accommodate the demand for more water cruises and land safaris.

The stepped up tempo of Meadview Terrace move-ins is keeping us busy installing water and electric services and the growth taking place in this community is becoming a very impressive sight indeed.

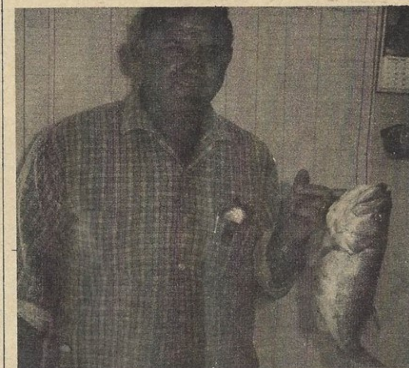

Meadview Marina Manager, Bert Edson, reports that fishing during the latter part of September was off and the fish that were weighed in were under the species qualifying line. October saw an increase in the number of fish brought in as well as an increase in weight. According to Edson the Bass are now in a better weight bracket and the Catfish seem to be growing larger by the week, as the records show.

There have been two weekly winners since the last issue of the Monitor was printed, those being Mike Debnar, Kingman, Arizona, who brought in a 4 lb. 7 1/2 oz. Catfish, caught in Iceberg Canyon, using shrimp as bait. Jack Miller of Buena Park, Calif. weighed in a 11 lb. 10 oz. Catfish caught in No. Bay just above Sandy Point. Miller was using Mud Sucker for bait. These two fishermen will each receive a \$5.00 Certificate as weekly winners, good for trade-in at the Meadview Marina store plus Mr. Miller will receive 25 points on the Trophy Line for a Catfish over 10 lbs. Also credited with 25 points on the Trophy Line but not a weekly winner, was Jim Bryant of Barstow. His 10 lb. 15 oz. Catfish was also snagged at No. Bay, Sandy Point.

All one needs to run up a high score in this contest is a fishing rod, tackle and bait, then go catch some fish and report to the Meadview Marina. They will do the rest and here's how it works.

In order to qualify your catch for the Scoreboard, all you have to do is weigh in your fish at the Meadview Marina store and have your photo taken to verify the catch. This is how the points are awarded:

There will be a Species Qualifying Line thus any Crappie weighing 1 lb. or over, Bass and Trout 2 lbs. or over or Catfish 3 lbs. or over will be awarded 1 point, if they are not winners. If the fish are on or above the qualifying weight and a weekly winner, the fisherman will receive 10 points plus a \$5.00 certificate. The largest game fish turned in each week regardless of species, will be that week's winner.

The \$5.00 weekly winning certificate can be exchanged for any commodity at Meadview Marina store.

There will be a Trophy line award of 25 points for fish of a species weighing in as follows: Crappie, 2 lbs. or over, Bass and Trout, 5 lbs. or over, Catfish, 10 lbs. or over. This way points can be accumulated even though you do not turn in the largest fish. Points will be added up and totaled each week on Friday at store closing time.

Marina Manager Edson, announced that in the December issue of the Monitor he will give the total points each fisherman has accumulated to date.

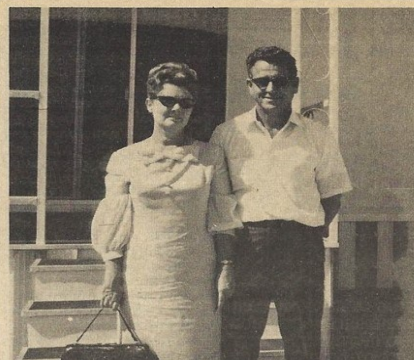

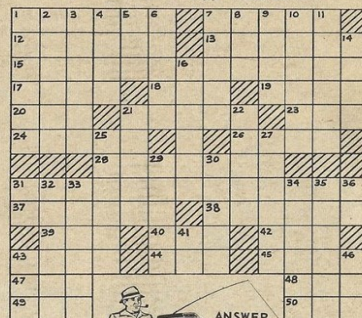

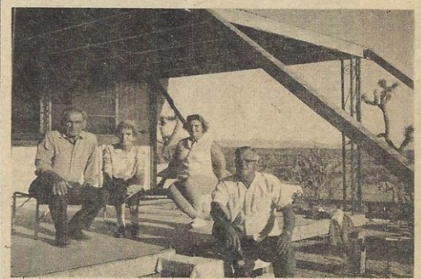

Bob works for the Air Force Base at Oxnard.

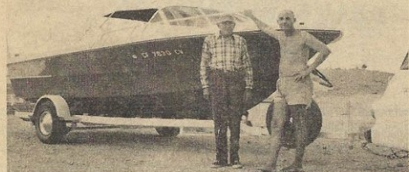

All in all it was a very successful party and Meadview extends its thanks to everyone and sincerely appreciates the show of acceptance of their community.



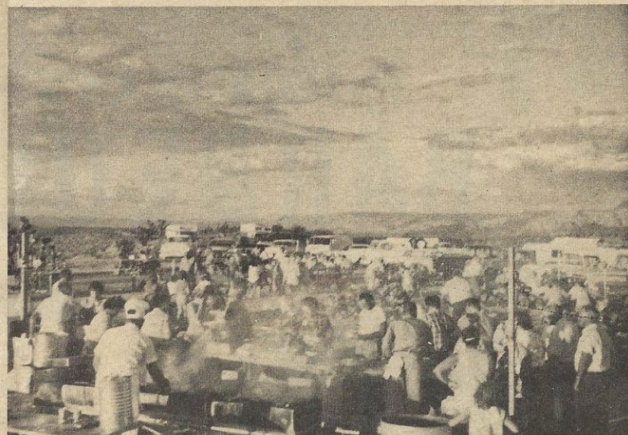

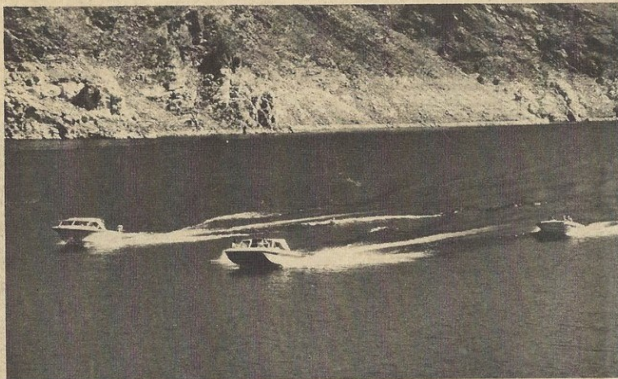

amount of fuel needed.

By HAL BROWN

Here are a few hints on what to expect on this Cruise. As you approach the river, through Iceberg Canyon, you are apt to encounter a rift or two of floating debris, made up of wood of various sizes, from twigs to tree trunks. All you have to do is slow down while in this area and keep a sharp lookout for the big pieces. Once through Iceberg, the debris lessens and there is, as a rule, only an occasional piece of this wood floating in the water. Watch for them.

You will also note there has been a color change in the water, a red cast that becomes darker as you proceed up lake. After passing Boundry Point the water has become more shallow and the river is beginning to form her channel. This is where the first sand bars can be encountered and are always present until we pass Reference Point Rapids.

After passing through the Narrows, we are really in the river current and those current boils are ever present. You are now in the silt flats, around the Pierce Ferry area, where the river winds its way, and has cut quite a deep channel, through the silt.

Just above Pierce Ferry, but still in the flats, is a sandy bank, with enough area to accommodate several boats. We chose this spot for a coffee break, our first stop on the cruise.

The mouth of the canyon is in view from this point

and after a brief stop we head up river. Within a short time one experiences the thrill of entering the colorful Grand Canyon. To me the spine tickling thrill is always there and I'm sure you will also experience this sensation as we progress up through this wonder of nature. Soon we come to a steel tower that looks miniature in size, due to the height above us. This is a part of the Bat Cave guano-mining operation, whose activity has long since ceased. The evidence of why it is no longer in operation lays in the river. A cable that once supported a tram, which hauled the guano from the cave on the north canyon wall to the above tower, lays there, a broken strand that once tied the two towers together.

Flour Sack Rapid #1 has just been crossed and we are approaching sneaky Wards Cave Rapid. No. 2 Flour Sack Rapid, at Cass Monument, has to be negotiated before we come to Quartermaster Canyon. You will find cruising relatively smooth for a ways. There are only four small rapids to negotiate before crossing the Reference Point Rapids, and then deep water is ahead of us.

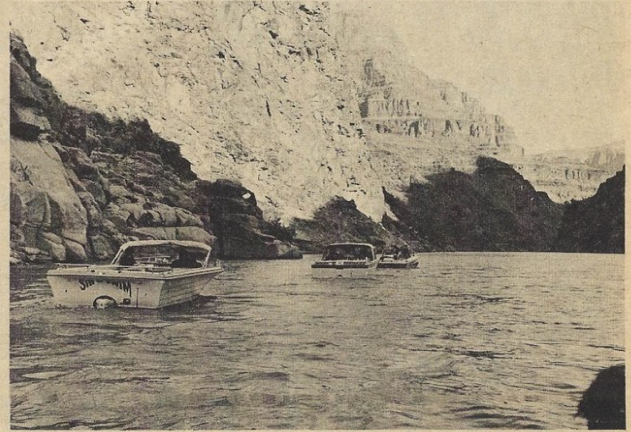
Don't let the mention of these rapids throw you, as they have been silted in and there is no longer the flow of fast water that gave them their name.

From now on relax, take in the view and enjoy yourself. That bluff up ahead does not stop you from reaching your destination, even though it looks that way. The sand beach further up is where we will have lunch and a short

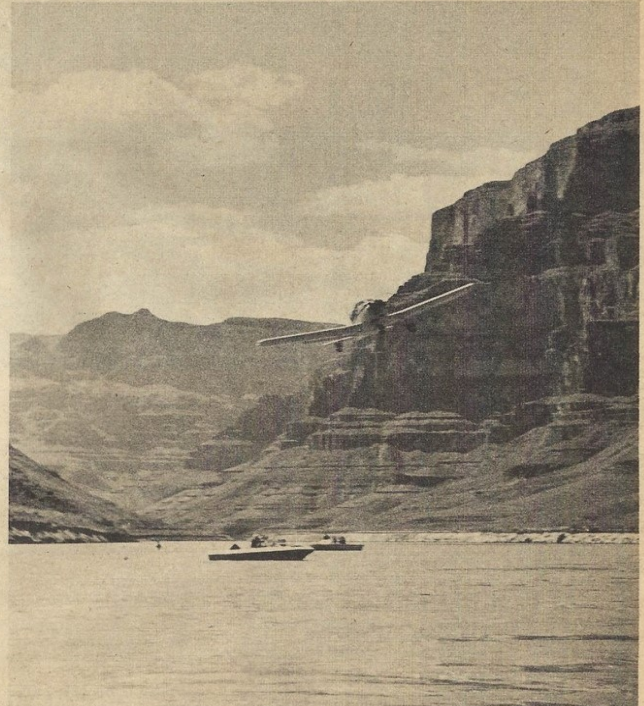

New Management Aide For Lake Mead Named

The arrival of James R. Brotherton, new management assistant for Lake Mead National Recreation Area, was announced by Superintendent Charles A. Richey recently. Brotherton assumes the job formerly held by Arthur Hehr who transferred to Chalmette National Historical Park, Louisiana.

Brotherton, a veteran of the U.S. Air Force, commenced his career in the National Park Service in the field accounting department of the Blue Ridge Parkway in 1952. After six years in this assignment he transferred to George

Washington Birthplace National Monument, Virginia as Administrative Aid. He was promoted and transferred to the position of Administrative Assistant at Cape Hatteras National Seashore, North Carolina, in 1966.

After a period of five years he was promoted to the position of Administrative Officer at Jefferson National Expansion Memorial in St. Louis, Mo., where he served until his present appointment at Lake Mead.

"Ray" is a native of North Carolina and is an avid fisherman. The Brotherton

family, consisting of his wife, Julie, and three boys, Jim, age 12, Alan, 1, and Tommy, 7, reside in Boulder City.

Waterfowl Season Changes Noted

Waterfowl season opened on October 10th this year and continues to January 7, 1968. This year the bag and possession limit will be five ducks per day and ten in possession. Only two of these five ducks may be canvasbacks and no more than two of these ducks may be in possession. Some previously published waterfowl rules pegged the canvasback possession limit at four, but this has been changed by Commission order to conform to Federal regulations. Only two canvasbacks in possession.

Firearm Regulation Change Reminder

Many sportsmen are apparently just now becoming aware that important changes were made in legal firearm regulations by the Commission during the May meeting. Biggest difference is that ANY centerfire rifle is now legal for the taking of big game. Muzzleloading rifles are also O.K. as well as .357 magnum, .41 magnum and .44 magnum pistols. The .22 rimfire magnum rifle using magnum ammo is legal for both turkey and javelina in addition to the above arms and turkeys may be taken with shotguns also. Check hunt map for complete regulations.

rest.

That afternoon, plan to explore the lower reaches of Separation Canyon, where we will camp over night. There will be plenty of time for an early evening side trip up Spencer Canyon to view its wonders.

Then it's back to camp for that cookout. We will bring the grill and charcoal.

Afterward--a story telling siege around the camp fire and then a good night's sleep under the stars.

The time logged is approximately 5 hours up river and about 3 hours downstream.

To compute your own gas needs, allow 3/4 gal. per H.P. for outdoors and between 1/4 and 1/3 gal. per H.P. for the stern drives. A 19' hull is the maximum overall length and a 14' the minimum that is recommended. All boats MUST have a good high freeboard and outfitted per Coast Guard code.

Be sure to bring enough fuel for the round trip by using the above gal. per horse power log or use your own calculation. The mileage is 64 miles each way, 128 miles round trip. There are no refueling spots along the upper lake or river areas, so have enough fuel so as not to spoil the fun by being towed.

The suggested list of gear to put aboard is as follows:

1. Hot coffee--We'll have two coffee breaks each way plus a lunch stop at Bridge Canyon.
2. Lunch enough for all persons aboard your boat. Sandwiches, coffee and refreshments may be purchased at the Meadview Marina if you wish to do so.
3. Food for cookout Saturday night. Food for breakfast and two lunches.
4. Sleeping bags or bedding, and toilet articles of your choice.
5. Two large towels in case it's overboard for a push off those sneaky sandbars.
6. One extra pair of knee length wool socks for each crew member. They sure feel good on the feet after a river wade!
7. At least 100 feet of 3/8" or 1/2" stout line. This has a two fold purpose--tying up to the river bank on the coffee breaks and maybe a tow off a sandbar.
8. One extra propeller plus several shear pins.
9. A camera or cameras of your choice with plenty of film.
10. One boat hook.

Be sure to allow enough time to stop at the Meadview Information Office and pick up the chart of the Colorado River from Grand Wash to Bridge Canyon.

The time is most important for all participants joining our cruise. The starting hour is 9:00 a.m., SHARP, (Arizona time) and we will leave South Cove promptly on time. We will have a pilots meeting at 8:45 a.m. so be prepared to take that in.

Co-ordinate your time so that your boat is in the water and ready to cast off on the signal, "We're Off!" Should any boat owner care to launch their boat anywhere else on the lake and join us at South Cove for this cruise, be sure to allow enough time and extra gas to rendezvous with us at 8:45 a.m.

Come join us in our invitation to adventure...a memorable cruise up the Colorado River through the Lower Grand Canyon to the Bridge Canyon Dam Site.

You will have a real challenge, a promise of thrills and fun galore with pictures to prove it and show to the less hardy folks back home.

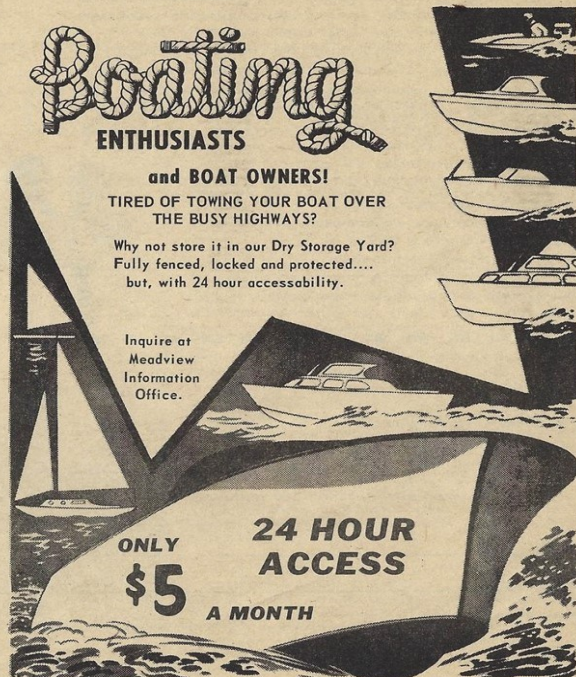
