

### FIRE WORK & OPEN FIRE RESTRICTIONS

FOR RESIDENTS THAT LIVE IN THE NORTH KINGMAN, BUTLER, VALLE VISTA, HACKBERRY, GOLDEN VALLEY, CHLORIDE, DOLAN SPRINGS, MEADVIEW AND OTHER UNINCORPORATED AREAS OF MOHAVE COUNTY ABOVE THE 2000' ELEVATION LEVEL THE FOLLOWING RESTRICTIONS APPLY:

- MOHAVE COUNTY HAS TEMPORAR-ILY PROHIBITED THE USE OF PER-MISSIBLE CONSUMER FIREWORKS. VIOLATORS OF THE PROHIBITION WILL BE SUBJECT TO CITATION AND PROSECUTION.
- OPEN FIRES AND CONTROL BURNS OTHER THAN THOSE FUELED BY PROPANE AND CHARCOAL.

THE PROHIBITION WILL REMAIN IN EFFECT UNTIL THE MOHAVE COUNTY EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT OFFICER DETERMINES THAT THE CURRENT FIRE EMERGENCY HAS ABATED AND THE FIRE RISK HAS BEEN REDUCED FROM SEVERE. SIMILAR FIRE RESTRICTIONS ARE CURRENTLY IN

PLACE ON ALL PUBLIC LANDS FOR THE BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT AND THE ARIZONA STATE FORESTER.

The following week we drove up to Hualapai Park, then headed on up the dirt road (?) past Flag Mine, Antelope Wash where the Wild Cow camp is located, Moss Wash, Borianni Mine and down to Yucca, then back to Kingman. The road was really not much better than a trail, good for guads. The 39 miles from Antelope Wash to Yucca took us five hours. Lunch was at the very top of the Ridge Road and the view was great. Only the 4x4 pickup had trouble on the last half mile down to the mine where a sharp rock jumped out and ruined a tire for Wally. ### The Battle of Gettysburg



The Gettysburg Address

The Gettysburg National Cemetery was dedicated by President Abraham Lincoln a brief four months after the Battle. Lincoln's speech lasted only two minutes, but it went into history as the immortal Gettysburg Address.

"Four score and seven years ago, our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation: conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war. . .testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated. . . can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war.

We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate. . . we cannot consecrate. . . we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember, what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced.

It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us. ..that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion. .. that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain. .. that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom. .. and that government of the people. ..by the people. ..for the people. .. shall not perish from the earth. "
